COUNCIL WORK SESSION MEETING MINUTES
FEBRUARY 28, 2022**

President Wesley Heyser called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM with the following **Councilors present:** Vice President Matthew Moon, Mr. John Lawver, Mrs. Judith Butterfield, Mr. Christopher Berger, Ms. Patricia Lawson and Mr. Chad Carr. **Staff present included:** Mayor Rita Frealing, Borough Manager Charles Gable; Assistant Borough Manager/Secretary Sara Stull; Borough Solicitor Harold Eastman, Barley Snyder; Police Chief Robert Glenney, Parking Manager Rebecca Fissel; Director of Historic & Environmental Preservation Debra English; Planning Director Carly Marshall; Public Works Director Robert Harbaugh and Chad Clabaugh, Borough Engineer, C. Representing the press was Jim Hale with the *Gettysburg Times*; and filming by *Community Media-ACCTV*.

Announcements

President Heyser announced an executive session of the Borough Council was conducted immediately prior to this evening's work session, commencing at 6:30 p.m., consistent with section 708(a)(4) of the Sunshine Act in order for the Council to receive information and to discuss and consult with its insurance defense attorney relative to certain legal matters and claims involving former Borough employee, Nicolette James.

President Heyser announced an executive session of the Borough Council will be conducted immediately following the adjournment of this work session consistent with section 708(a)(1), section 708(a)(4) and section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act for the following purposes: (1) to discuss matters involving the employment of current or former Borough employees; (2) to receive, review and discuss information in connection with issues on which identifiable complaints have been made or are expected to be filed; and (3) to review and discuss matters of Borough business which, if conducted in public, would violate a lawful privilege or lead to the disclosure of information or matters of confidentiality protected by law.

Public Comment – Restricted to Old Business and New Agenda Items (not tabled items).

Susan Cipperly, 314 North Stratton Street read a prepared statement regarding her concerns with the proposed text amendment for 68 West High Street (see attached).

Scott English owner 66-68 West High Street read a prepared statement addressing the Elm Street Overlay District that does encourage his proposed use for the property (see attached). He pointed out that there are only two residences and three churches along West High Street which could benefit from special events. He showed pictures circa 1940's of the structure noting one of them depicting the former use as a hotel tourist home.

Rosemary Meagher, 44 West High Street expressed her concerns with the proposed amendments for 68 West High Street stating that the parking is limited and busing may be difficult. She wasn't sure if the church would provide parking for the events. Ms. Meagher said that residents are not comfortable walking the streets at night in this area.

Jean Green, 4 Straban Court said that she supports the proposed changes to 68 West High Street property noting that she served on the Elm Street District Committee and the overlay was to encourage people to better their properties. She said that she grew up in this area and that she can recall stores on the street corners along with other businesses. Ms. Green said that she would like to see this part of town show-cased and bring the history back to the Elm Street District.

Special Presentation

Gettysburg Municipal Authority (GMA)

Mark Guise, Utilities Manager gave a presentation on the Capital Improvements Projects update for 2022 (see attached).

Gettysburg Sister City/Project Gettysburg Leon (PGL)

Dave Crowner introduced the video that shows the preparation and dedication early this year of a large mural on a wall in the center square of León, Nicaragua. He highlighted the sister-city relationship between León and Gettysburg which was officially established in 1990. The mural project was supported by the sister-city organization, Project Gettysburg/León, whose purpose is chiefly to promote "sustainable development." One such initiative, a school for the arts, produced artists who designed and painted the mural. Mr. Crowner closed by pointing out that the mural is a reflection of PGL's identity as a people-to-people community-oriented organization.

New Business

PBS 2022-01 Budget Policy - Departmental Spending

President Heyser explained that in the past several years the Borough has experienced significant cost overruns in personnel spending, specifically in overtime. These overruns only become apparent to Borough Council at the end of the budget year. He noted that the police department has exceeded the budgeted amounts for overtime by the following amounts: 2017-\$95,006; 2018-\$15,897; 2019-\$70,982 and 2020-\$90,190. There is currently no mechanism to address this and recommends that Council develop a plan for all

departments. All departments should provide Council with a personnel work schedule to include any overtime that is expected.

Councilman Moon said that the Personnel Spending Policy would need to be reviewed each year to see if changes would need to be made.

President Heyser said that it's timely communication from department heads to inform them of overtime needs, and noted that the Borough Council does not have access to the payroll system.

Chief Glenn said that his department work schedule is a 24-hour, 7-day-a-week schedule unlike the other departments. He said that he has tracked his overtime for the past two years and is unsure as to why he is over budget in his overtime. Chief Glenn said that he does not know why Council would need to know his officers' work schedule.

Councilman Moon said that the reasoning behind all departments providing a work schedule is to ensure that the time sheets coincide with them.

Manager Gable explained that a portion of the overtime is due to a full-time officer not using any of his vacation and the Borough had to pay him for that time.

President Heyser asked Manager Gable to provide a breakdown of the vacation buy-outs to see what the normal salaries were budgeted.

Councilwoman Butterfield said that the Policy Briefing Summary information has been helpful and thanked President Heyser for preparing it.

Councilwoman Lawson said that Borough Council members are stewards of the taxpayer dollars and must be accountable.

PBS 2022-02 Public Consumption of Alcohol Zones(s)

Manager Gable outlined ordinances used in other municipalities pointing out that Carlisle Borough has amended their ordinance to allow alcoholic drinks in specific areas zoned for commerce. He pointed out that Destination Gettysburg agency's website promotes the "Pour Tour" around the County.

Keith George, Purple Piggy Toys and Gifts, 13 Steinwehr Avenue presented a petition (see attached) signed by 24 business owners and 61 residents in favor of people to be free to carry and consume alcoholic drinks outdoors in certain parts of Gettysburg. The petition asks Council to rescind the current ordinance that makes it unlawful to drink alcoholic drinks in public streets. He said that he hopes this would promote the Borough's economy with more tasting rooms and events. It could also help with waiting on a table at a restaurant more enjoyable by being able to have a drink.

Chief Glenny expressed his concerns stating that this would be a public safety issue if people were allowed to walk around with alcoholic drinks, and there could be added problems with increased intoxication and littering. He said that it may also be a conflict with the state liquor regulations.

President Heyser said that this topic will be placed on the March Council Work Session to be discussed further. He asked Chief Glenny to contact the Liquor Control Board to clarify what the regulations are.

Old Business

Scott English – Zoning Text Amendment Request

Planning Director Marshall explained that the use for special events is trending in other areas and that the zoning text amendment would include indoor/outdoor events venue as a special exception in this district. It would be appropriate for Council to make a policy with a special event use and it could be evaluated each year to see if there are any code violations, complaints or other issues.

Councilman Carr said that the review should also show the benefits such as parking revenue and admission taxes received from those events. He said that he read that the Elm Street Program was established in 2008, and it was created to promote revitalization and preserve historic properties, and he supports the project. He noted that he would like the zoning text amendment to be for this specific area and not all over town.

Councilwoman Butterfield said that she was involved with several of the sub-committees with the Elm Street Program. She pointed out that the purpose of the Elm Street Program was to encourage both businesses and residences in the district to improve their properties. She said that she supports the project.

Councilman Heyser expressed his concerns with the proposed plan in this neighborhood district.

Councilwoman Lawson pointed out that there are Historic Church Walking Tours that travel in this area. She would be in support of the proposed project.

PBS 2020-07 Converting Parking Spaces into Outdoor Public Parklets

Planning Director Marshall asked for Council's input on whether to continue with the parklet program that was established during COVID to help businesses in the downtown area. She said that money collected in these areas were compared to see if the Borough was losing money; and that the square has increased but said that York Street has not recovered from COVID.

President Heyser asked Council if they wish to continue the program and the response was unanimous to proceed.

Councilwoman Butterfield said that the Adams County Arts Council plans to begin scheduling events in May so they would need to know if the program is continuing. She noted that they want to continue with the arts and music programs that were held in the parklet this past year.

Public Comment (open to items not on the agenda)

Muhammad Ashraf, owner 150 Carlisle Street LLC expressed his concerns regarding his property and the plans that he has for improving it. He said that plans were submitted a few years ago to the former planning director and that he believed were approved; but the current Planning Director Marshall won't approve his plan. He also asked if the Code Enforcement Officer needs approval before entering his property stating that he has received six citations within a one-week period.

Frank Walker, Marine Corps League, 145 Feeser Road, Littlestown said that he is a member of the Joint Veterans Commission and said that Bill Hewitt who spoke at the Council meeting last month was not speaking for the Commission. Mr. Walker said that the Commission will continue donating to the Toys-for-Tots Program and other organizations as in the past. He pointed out that the issue was the increased cost for the Memorial Day Parade.

Scott English owner 66- 68 West High Street said that many of the local citizens in the Elm Street District support the proposed project. He said that he would like to keep the property on the tax rolls and not convert the property to a non-profit whereas the Borough would lose the tax revenue. His hope is to make the property a destination area in Gettysburg.

Jacob Schindel former Councilor said that he was glad to attend tonight's meeting to see everyone and misses being a part of Council.

President Wesley Heyser adjourned the meeting at 9:55 PM.

Elm Street Overlay text amendment proposal

I'm here because for over 30 years I was a professional planner, and I believe you deserve some information about how the Elm Street Overlay came to be, rather than relying on the applicant's interpretation of the purpose. I don't live in the overlay, but I do live in an R-2 Residential zone on Stratton Street. I have fought to protect the livability of neighborhoods in all areas of town – often when outside investors would like to have the rules changed so they can maximize their profits from the use or the sale of properties. I e-mailed much of this information to you. I hope you have read it.

2007 Elm Street Plan – with consultant, State funded

Public input regarding issues, wishes, help for neighborhood

Objectives –

- Sustain the neighborhood, safety, no gentrification (that would replace current residents)
- Appropriate type, scale and magnitude of non-residential uses
- Elm Street program is not an economic development program like Main Street

2008 Borough Council – Elm St. Overlay ordinance

- Adopted Elm Street Overlay zone with neighborhood compatible non-residential uses and limits on their size. "context-sensitive"
- High Street Brews is the only retail commercial in the Overlay (in R-2 zone)
- General Commercial area (Franklin St.) not included in Overlay

2019 Central Adams Comprehensive Plan recommended limited uses and sizes.

Traditional Neighborhood

The Traditional Neighborhood setting is characterized by those areas of established residential neighborhoods within a built environment. Traditional neighborhoods are found within Gettysburg Borough, generally beginning between 1 to 3 blocks from Lincoln Square. These are stable residential neighborhoods comprised of a variety of dwelling unit types and serve a range of demographic groups and household incomes.

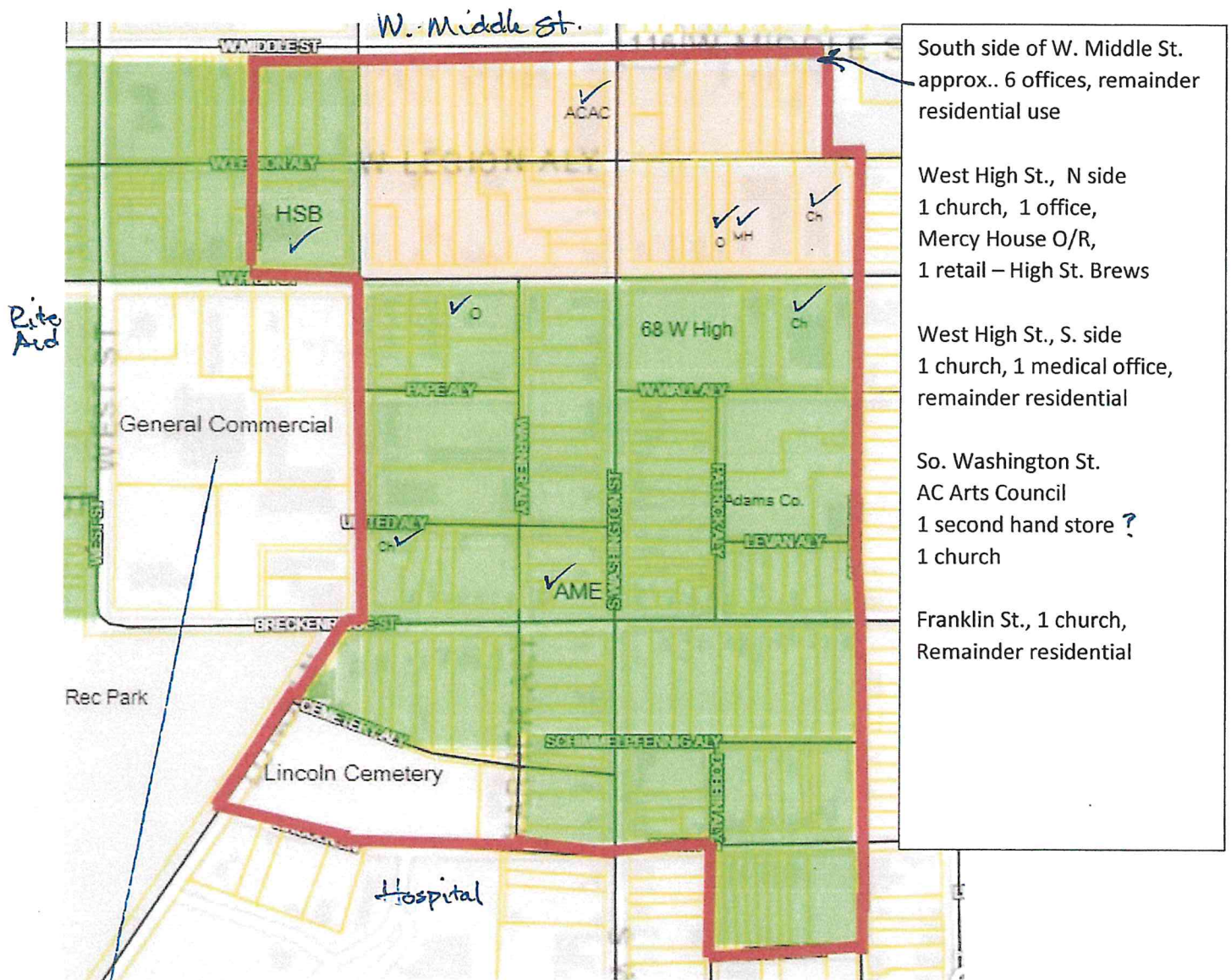
RECOMMENDATIONS:

- TN6.1 Residential development should be targeted to a density of around 6 dwelling units per acre.
- TN6.2 A variety of dwelling unit types, consistent with and complementary to the existing dwelling unit mix, should be permitted.
- TN6.3 The conversion of residential uses to nonresidential uses should be discouraged.
- TN6.4 Conversions of existing dwelling units to apartment units for two or more families should be accommodated. However, residential building additions that detract from the architectural character of the existing building and surrounding neighborhood should be precluded.
- TN6.5 Density and dimensional standards designed to retain the residential uses in these neighborhoods should be employed.
- TN6.6 Building placement and orientation, parking location, and other neighborhood design oriented standards should be included in zoning ordinance standards to retain existing neighborhood character.

2021 Borough Vacation Rentals Ordinance prohibited Vacation Rentals in the Overlay, to protect housing opportunities for residents in this neighborhood, specifically.

Current uses in Elm Street Overlay – predominantly residential (see map)

To insert a tourist attraction in the middle of this neighborhood would ignore all the efforts that have gone into the plans and ordinances. It would be a disservice to the current residents in order to provide financial gain to one out-of-town property owner. The people who actually live in the neighborhood deserve quality of life and peaceful enjoyment of their residence.

First, I want to apologize for the emails and Word documents that contain my mother's and my first wife's name – let me clarify by saying that I'm just a humble woodsman that did Army forestry work for 35 years and have very limited IT skills. Deb and I share an email (I have nothing to hide) and I'm using my Mother's old computer.

ELM STREET OVERLAY DISTRICT

Specifically encourages this type of mixed-use, and the few blocks of the Elm Street Overlay District in the Borough target the 3rd Ward. Our proposed use will leverage and enhance Gettysburg's tourist-based economy while highlighting opportunities in the 3rd Ward. Providing a walkable destination venue within the Borough will encourage more "downtown-centric" activity in the Elm Street neighborhood. The Borough needs to continually diversify, change, and promote new ideas and venues to keep people coming back and continue to visit our wonderful small town.

This portion of High Street currently has two residences along with existing mixed institutional, commercial, and business uses that we will not be out of line with. The three neighboring churches are currently hosting weddings and funerals weekly with the same noise and parking issues which have not been a problem to date. The Gettysburg Academy building was constructed as a school, gave birth to both of Gettysburg's institutions of higher learning and served my family as a Motel from the 1930s through the 1950s. Only one of the two neighbors has expressed any concern to us or the Council.

MODIFICATIONS TO THE REQUEST

With the two review cycles through the Planning Commission (100% unanimous support) they expanded our proposal to permit the Event Venue use within the Commercial and Industrial Districts in addition to our request for a Special Exception in the Elm Street Overlay District. The two review cycles also adjusted the setbacks for this proposal as noted.

The Gettysburg Academy will reduce the number of guests from 150 to 100 (excluding staff). Event hours are 9AM to 10PM not 7AM to 10PM, as noted in the last Council meeting.

Most attendees will be staying at other Borough B&Bs and Inns like the Federal Pointe Inn and will walk to the event venue. In cases where parking is needed, we have a written agreement with the Methodist church to park on their Wall Alley lot. If additional parking is needed there is metered parking in town, the parking garage, and if needed, we can park folks off site and bus them into town with the buses remaining outside of the Borough during the event. No idling buses adjacent to the property.

The Director of Planning and Zoning will conduct a yearly review of the events venue management plan to ensure compliance with ordinance requirements.

GETTYSBURG ACADEMY STAFF

There is no option for events to "get out of hand" as noted during the last Council meeting, as there will always be a Gettysburg Academy representative on site for all events to ensure the event goes smoothly and follows all ordinance noise and lighting guidelines.

As current permitted uses allow for restaurants and day care centers, our events would not exceed Nosie levels with already permitted uses within the Elm Street Overlay District. In addition, we will install a stockade fence.

OPEN HOUSES

The Academy has hosted three open house events to address concerns and showcase our plan. We had over forty-seven people attend, all with positive feedback. A few had concerns with parking which we addressed with our above plan. We received incredibly supportive comments from the attendees which seemed extremely excited that the house is now open to the public as a B&B and hopefully as an events venue.

We have received several supportive letters from local citizens and those that attended our open house. I canvased the area and in less than 30 minutes had nine local residents sign a petition in support of the outdoor events venue and said what a perfect use for the house!!

TAX BASE

Keeping the property in the tax base will bring in over \$36,000 over a 5-year period as well as other business-oriented taxes which will boost and support the Borough's economy. If the Academy moves to a non-profit status this income will be lost.

NEIGHBOR

The neighbor noted she has lived in the house for 6 years; the Elm Street Overlay District has been in place for over 15 years and promotes mixed business uses in concert with the State of Pennsylvania's 20-year-old program.

NOTES

This request is for the R2/ELM Street overlay not the R2 District throughout the Borough.

The Elm Street Overlay District encompasses only a few blocks of the 3rd Ward and is a community coordinated plan.

The big picture is that this request will update the ordinance to allow events in a perfect location and purpose to enhance an often-overlooked area of the Borough.

This request does not change the housing stock for the Borough.
