Gettysburg is very fortunate to have an extremely well qualified an experienced police department. All of our officers are Act 120 certified and annually receive a minimum of 16 hours of additional mandated training as well as periodic training in First Aid, CPR, and AED (automatic electric fibrillation). They also are required to qualify annually in the use of their firearms.

The department consists of a chief, two sergeants, a criminal investigator, and nine patrolmen. The officers are supported by 2 full-time civilian personnel—an administrative supervisor and a desk officer.

Our chief of police, Joe

Dougherty, has 41 years of public service. He has served as a lieutenant in the Reading, PA police department and as chief of police for two other communities before coming to Gettysburg. He also is a graduate of the FBI Academy—a certification that only one-half of one percent of all law enforcement officers has world wide.

Sgt. Kevin Wilson has 29 years of service and **Sgt. Larry Runk** has 28 years of service. All told, the police department officers have 214 years of experience.

Of the 15 municipalities in Adams County, Gettysburg is one of only five that provides 24/7 coverage for their communities.

The Gettysburg Police Department strives to foster positive interaction and understanding between businesses and residents and to proficiently provide services for the welfare and security of the citizens of Gettysburg.

BOROUGH COUNCIL UPDATE

For many years, Council met on the 2nd Monday of each month to address citizen complaints, change ordinances,

approve contracts, pay bills, make policy decisions and handle other affairs pertaining to the Borough. Due to the ever-increasing amount of business to be conducted and to respond in a timely manner to citizens and organizations who may be facing deadlines, the Gettysburg Borough Council recently decided to conduct 2 business meetings each month. Council intends to discontinue committees and try this new system for 6 months after which time we'll evaluate its success.

These meetings will be held on 2nd and 4th Mondays and will begin at 7:00 PM. in the Council Chamber. Once renovation of 59 East High St. begins, the meetings will be held in the Community Room of the Sterner Building at the Rec. Park.

During this time, issues pertaining to public safety, public works, finance, and community development should be brought to the attention of **Borough Manager Peter Marshall** for resolution (334-1160, ext. 222). Should he not be able to resolve the problem to the satisfaction of the citizen, the individual should bring the issue to his or her elected councilperson or to the entire Council.

BOROUGH SIGN ORDINANCE ENACTED

In March, Borough Council approved revisions to our sign ordinance (Chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances). The review, which began in March 2008, included much research, hours of internal discussion with the Borough's solicitor, consideration of comments and suggestions from community stakeholders, a public hearing, and many drafts. Many of the most important provisions remained unchanged. Here are some highlights of the new ordinance:

- The Chapter is reorganized for improved clarity and continuity.
- Requirements are now tied to zoning districts with some sign types prohibited or restricted in certain zoning districts.
- The process for review and approval is simplified and reduced from 30 days to 15 business days.
- Review by the Historic Architectural Review Board (HARB) is no longer required for signs proposed for the Historic District. However, if the sign does not conform to the Borough's Design Guide, HARB may be asked for a recommendation.
- Unsafe, abandoned and illegal signs are more clearly addressed.
- The maximum height of a sign remains at 9 ft. in the Historic District and 12 ft. outside the Historic Dis-
- The maximum sign area remains at 50 square feet except for billboards which increased to 100 square
- Billboards are restricted to the Industrial District and must comply with the U.S. Business Route 15 Scenic Byway Ordinance.
- Internally illuminated signs were prohibited in the Borough but are now permitted outside the Historic District.
- Variable message electronic signs are now defined and permitted outside the Historic District but may not be programmed to flash, roll, blink or be animated in any fashion.
- The use of banners is now more clearly defined, both for temporary and more permanent display.
- Signs representing political, religious or personal messages placed on private property do not require a permit.

Signs are an important component of the "look and feel" of the community and an important tool for business. Millions of visitors come to Gettysburg each year to enjoy its history and many of them make repeat visits or encourage friends and family to also make Gettysburg a destination. They must like what they see. Balancing the importance of maintaining and enhancing Gettysburg's historic character with the needs of the local business community was the primary goal of the revisions.

2010 BOND ISSUE

Recently the Borough of Gettysburg issued general obligation bonds in the amount of \$10,045,000. The bonds will be dated May 15, 2010 and the proceeds from the 2010 bond issue will be used to refund the 2004 sewer bonds for \$1,815,000, the 2004 water bond for \$4,370,000 and new money in the amount of \$3,860,000.

The new money will be used for a variety of things. The largest portion of the proceeds will be used for the Borough Hall renovations which will begin this summer. Other capital projects include but are not limited to the purchase of public works equipment, revenue control equipment for the parking garage, installation of energy savings lighting in the parking garage, sidewalk assessments and ramp replacements in compliance with the American Disabilities Act and street assessment plan and improvements.

The bond issue was sold on an internet auction. This process al-

lowed the Borough to get the best possible interest rates. The bond issue garnered a lot of attention and active bidding due to many factors, one of which was our strong financial rating from Standard & Poor's. Another reason for the extra attention is that the bond market is very interested in short term issues.

The 2010 issue by the Borough has a maturity date of November 15, 2023. Our bond council and financial advisors are to be credited with a very successful borrowing.






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ROUTE 30 REPAVING PROJECT



All this is part of a coordinated effort to prepare for the PennDot Route 30 repaving project scheduled to begin in mid-May. Route 30 will be repaved the length of the Borough including Lincoln Square, but will not include the metered areas on the square. The PennDot contractor will install new ADA compliant sidewalk curb cuts and ramps at all intersections with the cost shared by the State and the Borough. The Borough will use Community Development Block Grant Funds to cover our share of the cost.

In addition the four crosswalks located on Lincoln

Square will be removed by the contractor and paved. The Borough will be responsible for lining the crosswalks. The use of different materials at these heavily used crosswalks just has not worked and the Borough was faced with constant, costly repairs. This approach will reduce street deterioration and increase safety for pedestrians using the crossings, particularly at night.

While all this is happening, traffic flow will be reduced to one lane in some areas and delays can be expected. It is not anticipated that detours will be needed. Parking may be limited on some blocks as the project progresses. We hope that will not deter you from coming downtown to shop or eat or just to enjoy a summer walk. Alternate parking will be available on side streets and in the parking garage. The project is expected to be completed by late July. The reward for your patience will be a new, beautiful street free from bumps and pot-holes—at least for a few years.

BOROUGH PAVING SCHEDULE

It's paving season and the Borough has several projects on the schedule for 2010.



- West Wall Alley from S. Washington Street to Baltimore Street
- Court Alley from West High Street to South Street
- Warner Alley from West High Street to Cemetery Alley
- Schimmelpfennig Alley from South Washington Street to Court Alley
- Culp Street from Steinwehr Avenue to Johns Street
- King Street from Steinwehr Avenue to Johns Street

All alley and street repaying projects will be completed by our Borough Highway Department. The street work will include upgrades to sidewalk crossing ramps at all intersections.

You may have already noticed some of these sidewalk crossing upgrades being completed on West High and Breckenridge Streets. The cost of the repaving projects will be covered by the bond issuance authorized by the Council in April. Community Development Block Grant Funds will be used to cover sidewalk work.

In an effort to minimize inconvenience for our motorists, the highway crews will be working at night during the month of May to repaint crosswalk markings, parking stall lines and residential parking permit lines throughout the Borough.

Please be prepared to drive with extra caution through the construction zones during the repaving projects. Your safety as well as that of our crew is imperative.



UNIFORM CONSTRUCTION CODE

Effective May I, the PA Department of Labor & Industry transferred responsibility for administering and enforcing the PA Uniform Construction Code (UCC) for commercial buildings to the Borough. This change will provide better service to our property and business owners and greater control over construction within the Borough. The Borough has contracted with Commonwealth Code Inspection Services, Inc. to be our third party inspection agency for both commercial and residential buildings.

The purpose of UCC is to protect the health, safety and welfare of the public. It applies to new construction and to any alteration to an existing building that results in structural changes; remove a wall, portion off a wall or a partition (commercial building), change a means of egress, or add or relocate plumbing, electrical wiring or heating/cooling system. The best rule of thumb is that any construction or repair beyond an ordinary repair in covered by UCC and will require a permit and inspection.

Applications for permits are available at the

Borough or on the website www.gettysburg-pa.gov. Once an application is received, a plan review is conducted by Commonwealth Code (CC) within 15 days (residential) or 30 days (commercial). Before the application can be submitted to CC, the Borough must review the project for compliance with zoning and/or Historic District requirements. A Land Use Permit must be issued by the Borough before a UCC Building Permit is issued.

A Commonwealth Code inspector will review the plan to verify that all UCC requirements are met. Once the permit is issued the Borough will notify the property owner. CC will invoice the property owner for the cost of plan review and inspections. Payment must be received before the building permit can be released. Once the construction has been completed and inspected by CC, a Certificate of Occupancy will be issued.

GRANT UPDATE


On November 17, 2009 the Borough of Gettysburg received a \$250,000 Conservation Works Grant from the PA Department of Environmental Protection. The funding was available for energy saving/conservation projects which is a high priority in the planning for the municipal building renovation. As a result of this ARRA funding, the cost to the Borough for the project has been reduced from \$2.25 million to under \$2 million.

With the recent approval of the 2010 Bond Issue and the UCC permitting transfer complete, the Borough is ready to send out RFPs for the project. Once the contract has been awarded, work will begin. The project will be completed by May, 2011.

WHY REQUIRE INSPECTIONS?

Inspections are about the health, safety and welfare of our residents and ultimately could save a life. We occasionally receive complaints from landlords about our inspection program for rental units. Why are these inspections important? This true account illustrates one purpose.

Borough Code Enforcement Officer Dale Gettel conducted an inspection of an apartment. He found the unit well-maintained except that it lacked a required **carbon monoxide detector**. He advised the owner to install a detector in order to pass inspection. The owned complied but the detector immediately sounded an alarm. Assuming the detector was faulty, he installed another one which also sounded an alarm. The fire company was called in to check the rental unit and finding a **hazardous level of carbon monoxide**, it was determined that a chimney had become blocked causing deadly gas to enter the home. **Inspections = Safety and Security!**

Spring Brush Pick-up Begins May 24

Highway Crews will make 2 trips around the borough for brush-up from May 24—May 28. To ensure that your brush gets picked up, have it at the curbside or at the edge of the alley behind your property by the 24th. Leaves may be mixed with your brush for this pick-up. Do not bag your brush/leaves. Do not pile brush where it blocks the sidewalk or on the street as this could result in clogged storm drains if it rains.

Brush pick-up is a service to Borough residents only. Non-residents bringing brush into the borough are subject to fines. Please report any suspected abuses.

Remember, you can take your brush to the Highway Shed on Middle St at any time. If you have any questions or problems with pick-up, call the Highway Dept at 334-4666.
